

Office of Emergency Management (OEM)



- Chief coordinating body for disaster response
- Established by Section 418, Government Code and Chapter 13, Code of Ordinances
- Emergency Operations Center (EOC)

Be Aware







Houston faces a variety of threats and hazards:

- Natural Disasters
 - Hurricanes and Severe Weather
 - Winter Storms
 - Flooding
 - Extreme heat/cold
- Non-Nature Disasters
 - Hazardous Material Spill
 - Active Shooter
 - Cyber attack





- Learn your department's:
 - Emergency Action Plan
 - Continuity of Operations Plan
 - Mission during an emergency
 - Shelter-in-place locations and emergency exits
 - Outside meeting place in case of evacuation
- Identify alternate commuting options
- Know your position designation
 - Tier I, Tier 2, and Tier 3
- Have emergency contact numbers accessible





Tier II

- Similar to Tier I
- Without immediate, specific emergency roles
- May be necessary to execute duties for the City under certain

Tier III

 All City employees not specifically designated as Tier I or Tier II

HERT Launching Mar 5

- COH Staff
 - Tier 2 and 3
 - 200 or less employees
 - 5 employee minimum
 - 201-500 employees
 - 15 employee minimum
 - 500 or more employees
 - 30 employee minimum
- Training
 - Orientation
 - Workplace CERT
 - Red Cross training





Specific to your needs at home, vehicle and work


- ✓ Water and non-perishable food for at least 3 days
- **✓** Whistle
- External battery pack for cell phone
- ✓ Cash (ATMs may not work if power is out)
- ✓ Prescriptions for medicine
- ✓ Battery-powered radio
- ✓ Flashlight
- ✓ Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) masks, gloves, etc.







Update ESS



- Best non work contact information
- Used to notify of a major event
- May affect work schedule

Emergency Notification System (ENS) (Reverse 911)

When: Emergencies that affect your neighborhood Who: Public safety agencies in Harris and Fort Bend Countles, including the City of Houston How: Landline and mobile phones Sign-Up: Landlines are already included. Register your mobile and VoIP phones online at 911.org



Wireless Emergency Alerts

When: Emergencies that affect large areas Who: Local, State and Federal public safety agencies including the National Weather Service How: WEA-enabled mobile phones Sign-Up: No need to sign up. Your WEA-enabled phone will automatically receive the message.

Who should register for STEAR?


- Individuals who have a medical or access need which would prevent evacuation during an emergency
- Individuals who do not have adequate transportation to evacuate themselves
- Individuals who use a medical device which requires electricity
