Bird City Texas



In February 2020, the City of Houston was officially certified as a Bird City Texas Community by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Audubon Texas. Bird City Texas is a new certification program that recognizes leadership in bird conservation and community engagement.

The City of Houston, led by the Natural Resources Management program and in partnership with Houston Audubon, applied for the certification in 2019 by compiling various bird conservation efforts throughout the city.

Moving forward, the City of Houston and Houston Audubon will continue to fulfill the commitments below.
