Subject: FY03 Budget Amendments

I am pleased to submit the following Fiscal Year 2003 Budget Amendments for your consideration.

City Council

- Amend the budget of the Fire Department to fund the replacement of the current Quint apparatus, located at Station 101, with a new apparatus with an equivalent equipment capacity of a Ladder Truck and Pumper, formally referred to as Class A Pumper, with a minimum 500-550 gallon water tank capacity. This replacement apparetus will be staffed by Houston Fire Department with four men to a truck, twenty-four hours, seven days a week and Booster 101 is not to be reassigned but instead continue to be fully staffed twenty-four hours, seven days a week.
- Amend the budget to increase the Schior Citizens and Disabled Property Tax Exemption to \$50,000 from the current \$34,006.
- Amend the budget to reduce non-training related travel for all departments by a minimum of 50%.
- Amend the budget to eliminate all non-emergency (based on job descriptions) city take-home vehicles, related insurance and fleet maintenance services.
- Amend the budget to eliminate the 3% water and sewer transfer to the General Fund.

PROPOSED BUDGET

The purpose of this memo is to submit amendments to the Proposed FY 2003 Budget. Specifically, to amend the departmental budget of the Health and Human Services Department and the Houston Fire Department as provided below:

- To amend the FY 2003 department budget to restore funding sufficient to continue the health department's FY 2002 estimated service level of clinical hours/week, staffing and supplies. This amendment is conditional on the Health Department's commitment to provide all possible support to non-profit primary health care centers, including facilities that are or could be qualified as Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs).
  - 2-2 To smend the FY 2003 departmental budget to provide sufficient funding to begin implementation of the non-emergency medical transport pilot program submitted by Dr. Persse and to study other ways to elleviate the overuse of the city's ambulance system by non-emergency patients.

- Increase property tax exemptions for senior citizens and people with disabilities from the current \$34,006 to \$50,000.





Budget Amendment, FY03 Convention and Entertainment Budget

The Convention and Entertainment Department shall include in the next contract negotiated with the Cultural Arts Council of Houston/Harris County increased annual funding of \$100,000 for Talento Bilingue de Houston (TBH) and the Ensemble Theater.

Budget Amendment, FY03 General Fund Budget

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The administration will initiate in FY03 a cost/benefit study for the utilization of "associate" prosecutors at Municipal Courts. An associate prosecutor would be similar to an associate judge and would be utilized during peak need periods, thus allowing for a potential reduction in permanent prosecutor staffing. The study will be completed no later than February 1, 2003, thus being available for the FY04 budget cycle.

Budget Amendment, FY03 General Fund Budget

The Health and Human Services Department will initiate an internal study on the costs, benefits and drawbacks possible from merging with the Harris County Health Department and Harris County Hospital District. Previous studies prepared regarding merging services will be utilized to the greatest extent possible. The Health and Human Services Department will seek the cooperation of the Harris County Health Department and the Harris County Hospital District in preparing this study. The study will be completed no later than February 1, 2003, thus being available for the FY04 budget cycle.

I propose the following budget amendments for FY 2003:

- ➤ I Cut all travel budgets to zero. This would save \$3.5 million from the General Fund, and another \$2.2 million from the Enterprise, Special Funds, and Revolving Funds. (see attachment, "Travel Savings", 8 pages). Any travel expenses can then be approved by city council vote.
- ► 2 Fully fund Clayton Library to Fiscal 2001 levels.
- Reduce ad valorem taxes by one cent. This would send a strong message that we recognize taxpayers are struggling with increased valuations, and it would cost the city only a few million dollars in revenues.
- Increase ad valorem tax exemption to \$60,000 from \$34,006 per household for all low-income senior citizens and disabled citizens. Taxpayer must attest to income, including social security, medical compensation, pension, and income, of less than \$30,000 annually for the past year in order to qualify for the exemption.
- Dedicated funding for potholes and street and sidewalk repairs. This should be a top concern from both the operational and funding perspectives. It does not require new expenditure of funds, but allows us to track annual expenditures for this function.
- Assign TEN (10) attorneys within the legal department to deed restriction enforcement. Said move shall occasion no new expenditures, as these should be pulled from other functions in the legal department and assigned to deed restrictions.
- Apply all water and sewer fund excess funds toward defeasance of bonds, in order to prevent future rate increases. Declare that funds collected in the ALP fund will never be used for anything other than water and sewer projects or water/sewer bond defeasance.
- Renegotiate the ACS contract to improve ambulance revenue collections by TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT (25%) before re-signing the contract renewal. If the goal is not reached, terminate the contract at its expiration and engage another contractor.
- Institute a complete hiring freeze city-wide. Positions which open due to retirement, resignation, or termination should be filled by re-deploying current personnel where needed (including across department lines), and left vacant where they are deemed unnecessary by the position control committee.

I am submitting the following amendments for consideration to the Fiscal Year 2003 Operating Budget:

End the D.A.R.E. Program and return all officers to regular duty.

2) Remove the transfer of \$4.1 million from the Water/Sewer Enterprise fund to General Fund Revenues -(Miscellaneous/Other Revenues - line item - Other Operating Transfers). This transfer is being proposed by the administration as for "water and wastewater reimbursement to the General Fund for infrastructure purchased through the TIRZ financing mechanism".

Typically the General Fund would receive no additional revenues from a TIRZ's until the TIRZ was dissolved. regardless of what infrastructure is constructed (Streets or Water/Sewer). The City receives a fixed ad-valorem tax base from the TIRZ regardless of the TIRZ'z increased evaluations. Therefore regardless of the increase in property values or what infrastructure or expenditures the TIRZ pays for, the General Fund receives no more revenue or loses any revenues until the TIRZ is dissolved and the General Fund once again receives the full ad valorem tax base.

If the Water/Sewer Enterprise is to contribute for the water/sewer infrastructure that is built within the TIRZ, then it should be handled in the same manner as the current "Developer Reimbursement Agreement". This is when the Water/Sewer Enterprise system partially reimburses the developer for "public lines" that are constructed. The proper Water/Sewer reimbursement for the cost of infrastructure should be to the TIRZ so that the TIRZ could pay down their total debt burden sooner, therefore helping to retire all TIRZ debt sooner and dissolve the TIRZ sooner than would otherwise occur.

3) Water & Sewer Enterprise System and the Stormwater Utility Fund - Reduce transfer from Water/Sewer to Storm Water Utility Fund 227/20 from 5% back to 4% that has been in effect since 1995.

#### Information:

Increasing the amount of funds taken from the Water/Sewer Enterprise Fund, to spend on non-water/sewer uses, will cause water/sewer rates to increase with no benefit to the rate payer.

4) During FY03 there will be no Houston Fire Department shift change, from FY02, in City Fire Stations for Classified Fire Fighters and EMS Personnel.

#### Information:

The administration has been looking at possible shift changes for Fire Fighters and EMS personnel. Because the FY03 Budget is projected for staffing levels as now exist and there is no method for predicting the financial faltout of instituting any shift change scenario, it would be financially irresponsible to consider a shift change different than that proposed and planned for in this fiscal budget.

### FY2003 Budget Amendments - cont'd

5) For FY03, the City's Fire Department Booster Trucks will be fully staffed, as has existed in FY02, and Fire Fighters assigned to Booster Trucks will not additionally be assigned to another Emergency Apparatus.

#### Information:

The administration has proposed to utilize Fire Fighters assigned to Booster Trucks to also be assigned to another Emergency Apparatus (at the same time). This staffing scheme will cause an apparatus to be understaffed, (An Engine or Ladder would be understaffed if a Booster truck were needed to respond to a call), or a Booster truck would be left unstaffed and out of service, (When the Fire Fighter assigned to the Booster truck is required to staff the Engine or Ladder truck when responding to a call).

6) Remove \$1.2 million credit, (of the \$3.9 million) taken in line item 399 – Management initiative Savings, under the General Government account # 100/99. Amount would then be restated as (\$2,700,000).

#### <u>Information:</u>

The \$1.2 million credit is being taken for the Voice Over Internet Protocol (VoIP) project that was proposed by the city's CIO (Chief Information Officer). Since this project is not being implemented in FY03, this credit is improperly included.

#### FY 2003 Budget Amendments

1. Senior Citizen and Disabled Individual Homestead Exemption:

Increase in Senior Citizen and Disabled Individual Homestead Exemption to \$40,000 in FY 2003 with 10% increases per annum over the next five years for a total exemption of \$64,420 in FY 2008.

2. Reverse Auction Procurement Procedure:

Require that the Strategic Purchasing Division of the Finance & Administration Department use the reverse auction procedure for FY 2003 as defined by Sec. 2155.062(d), Government Code, for purchasing as set forth in "Texas Scnate Bill 221 Referring To Reverse Auctioning".

Said amendment shall require that the general fund and each of the three enterprise funds apply the reverse auction procedure for 50% of the total purchases of products and services in FY 2003.

MWBE Reciprocal Certification:

In an effort to reduce costs in the Affirmative Action Division and to aid qualified MWBE's desiring to do business with the City of Houston, any company which has been certified by the Houston Minority Business Council or the Houston Women's Business Council shall automatically be certified as a MBE or WBE with the City of Houston, respectively, and shall automatically be determined to be an established business enterprise for all SIC/NAIS codes listed for the company with those organizations.

The Affirmative Action Division shall only determine the size of the company as required by Section 15-87. Approval of this amendment could result in a 50% reduction in the budget of the Certification and Outreach Section of the Affirmative Action Division.

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(c) In applying the | competitive bidding-and-competitive proposal requirements established by Subsection (a), all separate, sequential, or component purchases of items ordered or purchased. with the intent of avoiding the (eempotitive bidding and eempetitive proposal) requirements of this subchapter, from the same supplier by the same county officer, department, or institution are treated as if they are part of a single purchase and of a single contract. In applying this provision to the purchase of office supplies, separate purchases of supplies by an individual department are not considered to be part of a single purchase and single contract by the county if a specific intent to avoid the [competitive bidding] requirements of this subchapter is not present.

SECTION 5. Subsections (a) and (b), Section 271.083, Local Government Code, are amended to read as follows:

- (a) A local government may participate in the purchasing program of the commission, including participation in purchases that use the reverse auction procedure, as defined by Section 2155.062(d), Government Code, by filing with the commission a resolution adopted by the governing body of the local government requesting that the local government be allowed to participate on a voluntary basis, and to the extent the commission deems feasible, and stating that the local government will:
- (1) designate an official to act for the local government in all matters relating to the program, including the purchase of items from the vendor under any contract, and that the governing body will direct the decisions of the representative; (2) be responsible for:
- (A) submitting requisitions to the commission under any contract; or
- (B) electronically sending purchase orders directly to vendors, or complying with commission procedures governing a reverse auction purchase, and electronically sending to the commission reports on actual purchases made under this paragraph that provide the information and are sent at the times required by the commission;
- (3) be responsible for making payment directly to the vendor; and
- (4) be responsible for the vendor's compliance with all conditions of delivery and quality of the purchased item.
- (b) A local government that purchases an itom under a state contract or under a reverse auction procedure, as defined by Section 2155.062(d), Government Code, sponsored by the commission satisfies any state law requiring the local government to seek competitive bids for the purchase of the item.

SECTION 6. Subchapter 2, Chapter 271, Local Government Code, is amended by adding Section 271.906 to read as follows:

- Sec. 271,306. REVERSE AUCTION METHOD OF FURCHASING. local government, as defined by Section 271,081, may use the reverse auction procedure, as defined by Section 2155.062(d), Government Code, in ourchasing goods and services in place of any other method of purchasing that would otherwise apply to the purchase.
- A local government that uses the reverse auction procedure must include in the procedure a notice provision and other provisions necessary to produce a method of purchasing that is advantageous to the local government and fair to vendors.

SECTION 7. Subsection (a), Section 44.031, Education Code,

Section 23, Development Corporation Act of 1979 6-15 6-16 (Article 5190.6, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), is amended by 6-17 adding Subsection (e) to read as follows: 6-18 (e) A corporation may use the reverse auction procedure, as 6-19 defined by Section 2155.062(d), Government Code, for purchasing. 6-20 (a) The changes in law made by this Act apply SECTION 11. 6-21 only to a contract for which requests for bids, proposals, or other 6-22 applicable notice of an intent to contract are published or 6-23 distributed on or after the effective date of this Act. 6-24 (b) This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote 6-25 6-26 of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does 7-1 not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes 7-2 7-3 effect September 1, 2001.
