GRANTS WORKING GROUPS

In 2023, HAA launched the Grants Working Groups. These groups now play a major role in creating the annual grants evaluation. The groups are composed of arts community members who review and provide input on every aspect of the grants process. HAA invites arts community leaders, arts managers, artists, and creatives to join the grants working groups.

GRANTS DATA

The total number of applications submitted increased from 479 in 2022 to 743 in 2023.

• +264, representing a 55% gain.

HOT-funded award totals increased from \$14.8 million in 2022 to \$17.4 million in 2023.




\$4.5M were paid in fees for artists and conservators for work on new art acquisitions and conservation projects, through **Houston Arts** Alliance.

The City's Civic **Art Collection** currently holds +008 accessioned works of art and represents artwork from **516** artists.

Funds were allocated to initiate **22** new projects.

HAA managed a total of **58** active projects on behalf of the City of Houston.


