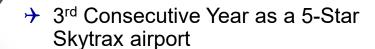

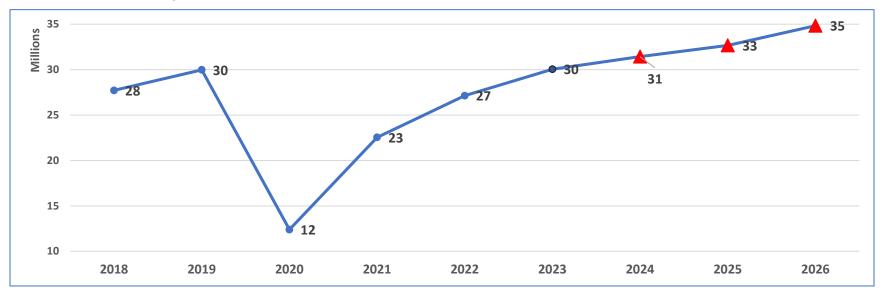




# Houston requires world class facilities to meet projected travel demands



### HAS Total Enplanements (2018 – 2026)



- → Enplanements have recovered strongly and will surpass 2019 pre-pandemic levels this year.
- FAA's long-term passenger forecast (TAF) is projecting a 2x increase in enplanements at Houston area airports over the next 25 years.
- Future enplanement growth driven primarily by higher airport utilization as airlines schedule more flights using larger planes to simultaneously meet demand while maximizing profit margins.
- All values are for calendar year

- 2024 total Actuals through Feb 24 + Forecasted values from Mar 24 through Jun 24
- 2025 & 2026 Forecasted values for entire year

## **Major Capital Projects**







#### International Terminal Redevelopment Program (ITRP)

- D-West Pier opening late summer 2024
- International Central Processor
  - Phase 1 opening early 2025, Phase 2 opening summer 2025





#### **Terminal B Redevelopment**

- Modernizing Terminal B by doubling the central processor and adding 22 narrowbody gates that can service domestic and international flights
- Projected completion in late 2026





#### **Central Utility Plant Upgrade (CUP)**

- Replacing CUP assets reaching end of life and adding additional capacity and efficiency upgrades required for future domestic terminal expansion
- Projected completion in 2026





#### **West Concourse Expansion**

- Expanding the West Concourse through construction of 7 new gates that can service domestic and international flights
- Projected completion in 2027

### HAS Revenue Highlights



### Revenue for FY25 is projected to be \$697.7M, 12.0% over FY24 estimate

- → Airline revenues from landing fees and terminal rents are projected to increase by \$67.4M (20.8%) due to:
  - → Additional cost recovery in the airfields and terminals
  - → Airlines utilizing larger aircrafts to accommodate higher enplanements.
- → Parking is a significant source of non-airline revenue and is projected to increase \$7.5M (6.2%) due to increased passenger traffic.
- → Revenues from ground transportation and retail concessions are projected to increase \$6.0M (8.0%).
- → Automobile rental concession revenue is projected to increase \$0.97M (2.6%).

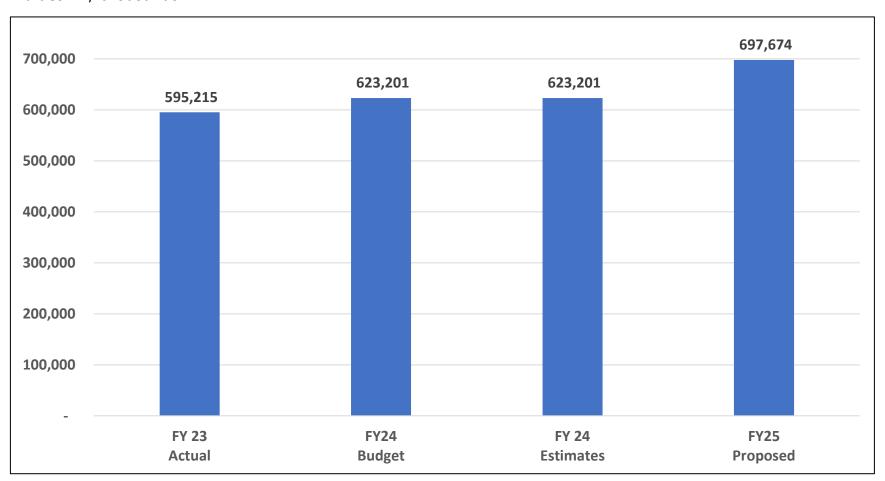

### HAS Expenditure Highlights



# Total Expenditures for Fund 8001 in FY25 are projected to be \$697.7M, 12.0% over FY24 estimate

- → O&M expenditures are budgeted to be \$393.4M, an increase of \$35.7M (10.0%) over FY24 estimate
- → Personnel budgeted to increase by \$6.8M (4.9%) due to run rate of volume driven FY24 FTEs and additional ITRP staffing
- → Supplies and Non-Capital Equipment are budgeted to increase by \$1.2M (13.9%)
- → Contracted Services are budgeted to increase \$26.1M (12.4%) primarily maintenance for Terminal D complex and ICP
- → HAS pays \$126.1M to the General Fund for services provided by HPD, HFD, HR, IT, Legal, Water/Sewer and others, an increase of \$10.5M (9.1%) over FY24 estimate
  - → Police Services (HPD Interfund) \$41.6M \$3.3M increase (8.5%)
  - → Aircraft Rescue & Fire Fighting (ARFF Interfund) \$25.5M \$2.3M increase (10.0%)
  - → Utilities(Water, Sewer, Electricity & Natural Gas) \$25.9M \$2.4M increase (10.2%)
  - → Property Insurance of \$11M \$0.47M increase (4.4%)

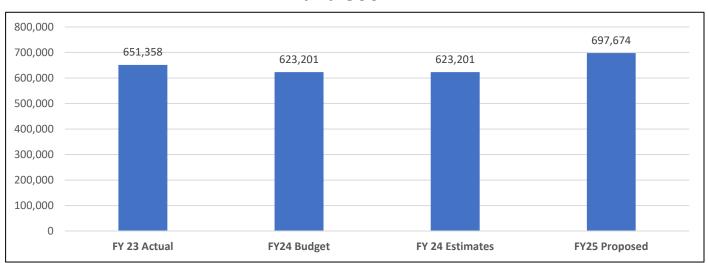

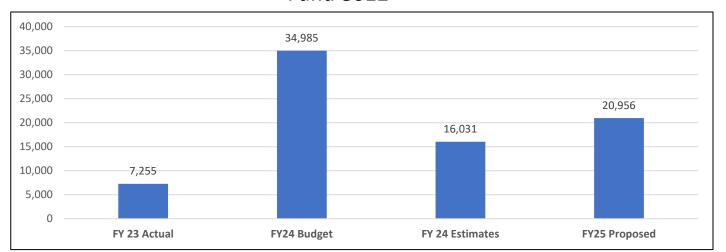

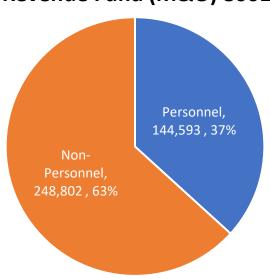


# Personnel vs. Non-Personnel FY 25 Proposed

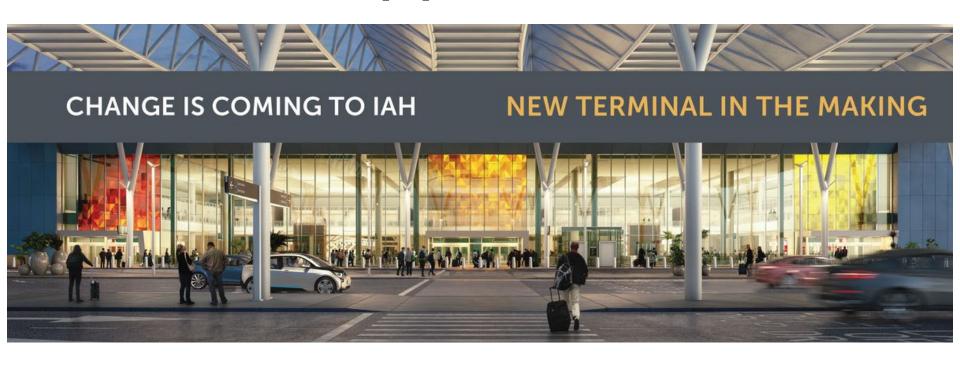

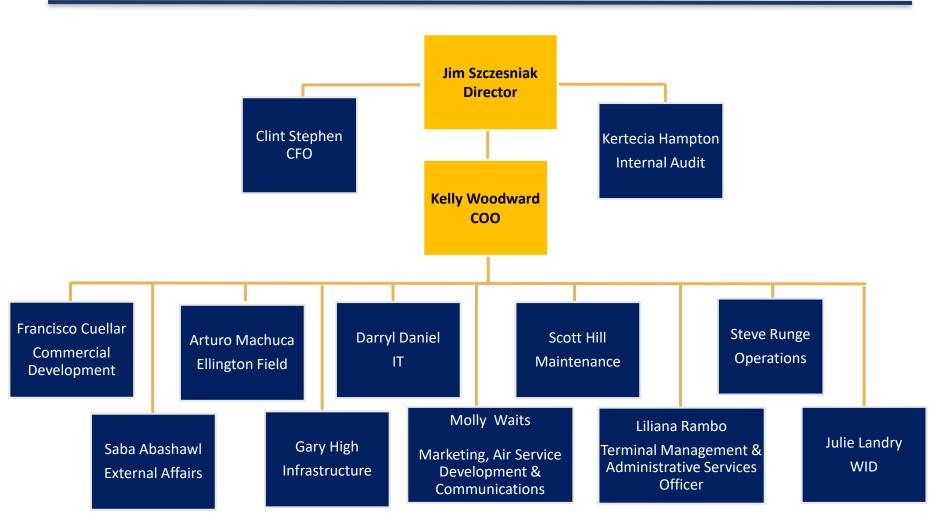

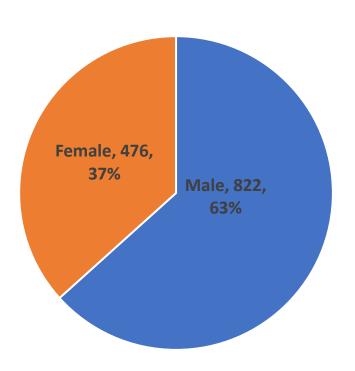

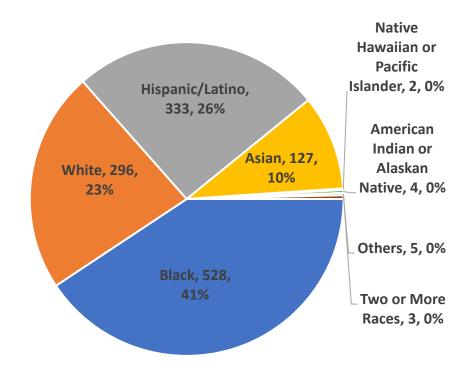

HAS Headcount by Gender



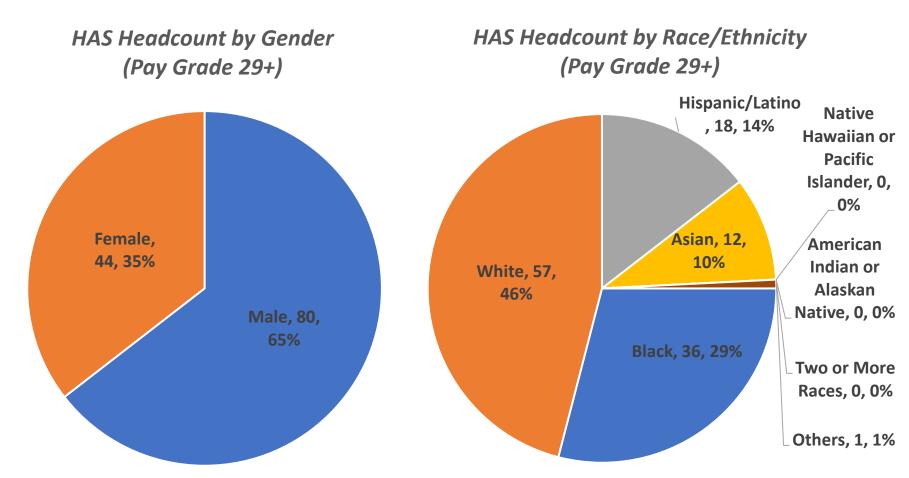
#### HAS Headcount by Race/Ethnicity
