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

Housing and Community Development Department

HCDD administers four grants funded through the **U.S.** Department of Housing and Urban **Development (HUD)**

Funding Priorities are

- Affordable Housing
- Supportive Services
- Infrastructure / Neighborhood Services
- Economic Development Funding

HCDD receives Entitlement Grants and Special **Grants**







Entitlement Grants

CDBG finances housing, public services, public facilities and improvements, and economic development

HOME promotes public-private partnerships to expand the stock of affordable housing opportunities for renters and homeowners

HOPWA funds the provision of housing and social services for persons with HIV/AIDS and their families

ESG finances the provision of shelter and services to the homeless population or those at risk of becoming homeless








Program Year 2011 to Program Year 2015 Grant Allocations



What is the Consolidated Plan?

The Consolidated Plan is HCDD's 5-year strategic plan

- Identifies local community needs including housing and non-housing needs
- Shows goals and objectives for the 5 year period
- Prioritizes and guides activities
- Is required by HUD to receive the community's entitlement
- The City submitted its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan to HUD in May 2015 with the five year strategic plan period beginning July 1, 2015





HCDD's 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan Goals

- Preserve and expand the supply of affordable housing
- **Expand homeownership opportunities**
- Provide assistance to persons affected by HIV/AIDS
- Reduce homelessness
- **Enhance quality of life**
- Revitalize communities
- Foster community economic development
- Promote fair housing








Annual Action Plan

Every year, the City develops an Annual Action Plan to identify specific projects and programs to fund using the federal grants

The Annual Action Plan serves as the grant application for entitlement funds

This year the City will submit a its second Annual Action Plan of the five year strategic planning period

2014 Accomplishments

Constructed or rehabilitated 16 public facilities

Rehabilitated 135 units of affordable rental housing

Provided services to 17,608 youth through city and nonprofit sponsored programs

Assisted 382 households with tenant-based rental assistance and rapid rehousing assistance to prevent homelessness

Provided housing and supportive services to 4,608 households to individuals with HIV/AIDs

What is the AI?

An Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) is

- A review of problems that affect the rights of fair housing choice
- A review of public and private policies, practices, and procedures that affect housing choice
- A basis for fair housing planning which outlines the actions that the City expects to take to enhance fair housing choice

Barriers to fair housing choice are any actions, omissions, or restrictions that restrict, or have the effect of restricting, the availability of housing choices based on protected classes







Fair Housing Act

The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination against any of the following protected classes:



- Race
- Color
- National Origin
- Religion
- Sex
- Familial Status
- Handicap / Disability







Fair Housing Act

The Fair Housing Act prohibits:



- Discrimination in the rental or sale of housing
- Discrimination in the terms, conditions, privileges, services or facilities of housing
- Making, printing, or publishing discriminatory advertisements
- Representing that housing is unavailable to a protected class when housing is actually available

Fair Housing Impediments

Fair Housing and Neighborhood Rights

- The right to choose
- The right to stay
- The right to have a say
- The right to equal treatment







Fair Housing Impediments

The Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice found the following impediments

- Discrimination in Housing
- Lack of Knowledge about Fair Housing
- Lack of Affordable Housing Options
- Lack of Accessible Housing for Persons with Disabilities
- Lack of Income/Lack of Funding
- Segregated housing patterns
- Affordability
- Lack of Financial Education







Fair Housing Impediments

Impediments continued...

- Imbalanced distribution of Amenities, Services, and Infrastructure between Neighborhoods
- NIMBY Resistance
- Lack of Transportation Options
- Low Educational Attainment Among African Americans and Hispanics
- Increased Health Hazard Exposure in Certain Neighborhoods
- Lack of Communication between Government and Residents







Five Year Fair Housing Actions


Selected actions to overcome impediments

- Counsel 7,500 people through the City's Fair **Housing Hotline**
- Provide fair housing education or outreach to 500,000 citizens
- Monitor private lending data and HUD fair housing complaint data annually
- Partner with other organizations or City Departments to promote fair housing education, financial literacy, and HCDD programs
