

Entitlement Grants

CDBG

Community Development Block Grant

Finances housing, public services, public facilities, and economic development

HOME

HOME Investment Partnerships Grant

Promotes public/private partnerships to expand affordable housing stock for renters and owners

HOPWA

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS

Funds housing and social services for persons with HIV/AIDS and their families

ESG

Emergency Solutions Grant Funds shelter and services for homeless persons and those at risk of becoming homeless





What is the Consolidated Plan?

The "Con Plan" is HCDD's five-year strategic plan

- Identifies local community needs including housing and non-housing needs
- Shows goals and objectives for the five-year period
- Prioritizes and guides activities
- Is required by HUD to receive the community's entitlement
- The City submitted its 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan to HUD in May 2015 with the five-year strategic plan period beginning July 1, 2015



FIVE-YEAR GOALS (JULY 1, 2015 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2020)



Preserve and expand the supply of affordable

housing: repair homes, reduce exposure to leadbased paint, and fund new construction and rehabilitation of rental units



Expand homeownership opportunities:

assist homebuyers by increasing housing options for low- and moderate-income families



Provide assistance to persons affected by HIV/

AIDS: support housing and services for persons/families with HIV/AIDs



Reduce homelessness:

provide homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, and other services for the homeless or those at risk of becoming homeless

Promote fair housing:









Fair Housing Act

The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination against any of the following protected classes:

- Race
- Color
- National Origin
- Religion
- Sex
- Familial Status
- Handicap / Disability



Fair Housing Act Prohibits

Discrimination in the rental or sale of housing Discrimination in the terms, conditions, privileges, services or facilities of housing

Making, printing or publishing discriminatory advertisements Representing that housing is unavailable to a protected class when housing is actually available


